Respect Local Customs and Traditions:

When visiting religious sites in Sri Lanka, it's important to dress modestly by covering your shoulders and knees. Before entering temples or other religious places, remember to remove headgear and shoes as a sign of respect. When taking photos, be mindful not to turn your back on statues or religious images. Additionally, please note that alcohol sales and consumption are prohibited on full moon Poya days, which are significant religious observances in the country. Respecting these customs ensures a culturally sensitive and respectful experience during your travels in Sri Lanka.
